

ABOUT THE BOOK

Hi! ¡Hola! A friendship story in English and Spanish! ¡Un cuento de amistad en inglés y español!

Rene Colato Lainez, a teacher in a bilingual kindergarten classroom, has crafted an ingenious series that authentically and naturally uses conversation to introduce children to English and Spanish. The fun friendship stories engages children while simple words, short sentences, and a glossary reinforce learning.


It's the first day of school and two students who speak two different languages, Joe and José, meet for the first time. As the two get to know each other, whatever Joe says in English, José says in Spanish. The students learn to paint together, embracing both their similarities and differences along the way in this bilingual picture book.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Study the front cover of the book. Which boy's native language is English? Which boy speaks Spanish? Theme is what the book is about. Consider the title of the book, and discuss the theme of the story.
- What does the illustration on the back cover reveal about what Joe and José enjoy doing? What are the items on the end pages? How do these things connect to the back cover art?
- Joe and José meet in their classroom at school. Look closely at the first double-page spread. How are the boys friendly to one another in spite of their cultural differences? Describe their teacher. How does she react to the boys greeting one another?
- Joe introduces himself in English, and José in Spanish. Study the hand motions of both boys throughout the story. Explain how their hands help communicate what they are saying to one another.

- Why do you think the boys are wearing aprons? Explain why each boy has only three colors of paint. Name the colors in English and Spanish. What is so important about red (rojo), yellow (amarillo), and blue (azul)?
- Joe says that he needs green. How does this give both boys an idea? Explain how they make green.
 What color does yellow and red make? How do the boys make purple?
- Study the last double-page spread. How are Joe and José's pictures alike? How are they different? Name all the colors in their pictures. What is the purple object in Joe's painting? Why do you think José put an airplane in his picture? Explain how the pictures show how each boy sees the world around them.
- Joe and José are from different cultures. They each paint a sun (sol), a house (casa), sky (cielo), and flowers (flores). How does art unite the two cultures?
- Look at the last page. What does a high five mean in both languages?





We Play Soccer Jugamos al Fútbol

ABOUT THE BOOK

Joe speaks English. He loves soccer. José habla español. A José le gusta el fútbol. This story is in **English and Spanish!**

Two boys, an English speaker and a Spanish speaker, are on the same soccer team. They have their uniforms and their cleats. They can both juggle the ball. At first, the boys must wait on the bench. But when the coach lets them in the game, both Joe and José score goals. "We win," says Joe. "Ganamos," says José.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Discuss the front cover illustrations and the book title. What do you notice about these words? (point to the red words, jugamos al fútbol) You might not recognize these words because they are Spanish, not English. Explain that "jugamos" means "we play" and "al fútbol" means soccer. The game of soccer is called football in other parts of the world.
- Who are the main characters in the story?
- What happens at the beginning? What happens in the middle? How does the story end?
- How do the boys feel? Why? How do you know?
- José and Joe speak different languages. How can they be friends?

ABOUT THE CREATORS



René Colato Laínez is the author of several bilingual picture books, including Senor Pancho Had a Rancho, ¡Vamonos! Let's Go!, and Playing Lotería, which was nominated for the Tejas Star Book Award, the K-6 bilingual counterpart to the Texas Bluebonnet Award. He lives in California, where he teaches a bilingual kindergarten class. Through his work as both an author and an educator, René hopes to help all children develop positive self-images.



Nomar Perez grew up in Ponce, Puerto Rico, where "an amazing array of colors, sounds, and flavors" influenced his artistic life. He is the illustrator of two bestselling books: All Day Long, God Loves Me and Everywhere I Go, God is With Me. He is also a staff artist at American Greetings. Nomar currently lives in Cleveland, Ohio.

ABOUT THE BOOK

Joe and José go to the park for a day filled with games and making new friends.

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Describe the boys on the cover of the book. How are they having fun? Study the title page and the verso (left page). Which boy speaks Spanish, and which speaks English? Note the book each boy is reading. What is the book about? How do you know they are reading the same book?
- What do you notice about the boys' names? Discuss how they greet one another. How are the boys meeting one another for the first time? What do they learn about one another? Debate whether they are best friends by the end of the book.
- The boys play on various pieces of equipment in the park. Name each piece of equipment in English and Spanish. Discuss whether the boys have a favorite piece of equipment.

- How do Joe and José end up in a baseball game? Which boy hits a home run? How do the other players celebrate his victory?
- Point to the illustration in the book that suggests the park needs cleaning up. How do the baseball players take on this task? "Yes" and "Si" mean the same thing. Discuss how these words are illustrated. How does high five mean the same thing in any language?
