

ABOUT THE BOOK

The launch of a picture book series about the adventures of a book-loving bat and his buddies as they patrol and protect their library home.

Booker the bat has completed his training and he's excited to report for duty as the newest guard at the Joanina Library in Coimbra, Portugal. His job is to fly through the stacks at night, gobbling down the bugs that are in turn eating the 200,000 antique leather books. There's only one problem: how will he fit in with the other guards? They're so cool and confident, and what if they don't like him? But when Booker spots a human attempting to steal pages from one of the valuable books, he summons his courage, (echo)locates the other bat guards, and swoops in with a plan to save the day!

DISCUSSION QUESTIONS


- Define guard. What is the job of a book guard?
- Read the paragraph about Joanina Library in Coimbra, Portugal. How did the bats become known as guards? How does the illustration on the first double-page spread reveal Booker's desire to work in the library? Explain the significance of his name.
- Booker is the library's newest guard. What does he learn the first night on the job? Explain what he means when he says his first night feels "like his first day of school." Why does he worry about fitting in with the other guards? Note the other guards. What does Booker see and hear when he looks up from his book?



- What does Booker learn about Rocco, Teddy, and Tess on pages 5 and 6? Point out Booker in the illustration on page 6. Why is he hunched at the bottom of the page? There is a lot of humor in the book. How is this double-page spread especially funny? Discuss how Booker worries about being funny after observing the other guards.
- What is the rare book room? How are the books in this room especially valuable? What does Booker discover in this room? Explain how the illustration on pages 9 and 10 shows that an evil act is occurring. Look closely at the illustration. Why do you think only the man's hands and the dagger are shown? How does the beam of light from the flashlight lead readers' eyes to the crime?
- What is Booker's plan to ensure the thief is caught? He gathers the other guards to help. Explain why poop is their best ammunition.
- Study the last illustration. How do Booker's wings make him look as though he is taking a bow? What does the smile on his face indicate? Does Booker ever have to worry about fitting in again?
