DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- The setting of a book is when and where it takes place. Identify the setting of this book. How does the cover art reflect the night setting?
- Identify the large shape in the cover art. Explain how a cat is an appropriate animal for a night garden.
- Follow the cat throughout the book. How does the direction the cat is walking draw the reader to the next page? Point out the pages where the cat is resting.
- Note the page with the flying bats. How does the artist create the flight path of the bats? Note the different moons in the book. Compare the new moon and the harvest moon.

- The illustrations are created in collage. What is a collage? Identify the various items used to create the artwork. How do you think the circle or bubble around the fireflies was created? Discuss how the artist illustrates wind.
- Discuss how the book calls upon the senses of touch, smell, sight, and hearing. What words in the text reference sight, hearing, and smell? Explain how the collage technique creates texture.
- Study the girl's room at the end of the book. Discuss the pictures on the wall. What do you see through the window? How many things in the girl's room did you see earlier in the book? Explain how the last double-page spread brings the book to a conclusion. How is this a bedtime story?
