

ABOUT THE BOOK

Readers will go behind the scenes of Georgia O'Keeffe's famous flower paintings to her sustainable homestead in New Mexico, where art was everything and everything was art.

Most of us have heard the name Georgia O'Keeffe—she's one of the most famous women in art history. But readers may not know that for most of her life, she lived on her own land in New Mexico, grew her own food, bought locally, and even made her own clothing.

Georgia's garden and her art fed and enriched one another, just as her bean plants enriched the soil and her home-grown feasts fed her friends. In spite of the era's prejudice against female artists, Georgia lived and thrived in her verdant sanctuary well into old age.



DISCUSSION QUESTIONS

- Study the title page. Name the items on O'Keeffe's art table. Point out the gift from her garden. Take a close look at the first double-page spread. Explain the frame of flowers around O'Keeffe. She is painting on a very large canvas. What do you think she sees?
- How is her garden an inspiration for her art? Why does she want others to see flowers and nature as she does? Define "nourish." Discuss how her art nourishes those who see it.
- Why do you think O'Keeffe left New York City for New Mexico? Contrast the color palette of the city with that in New Mexico. Explain why she feels "free" in New Mexico.
- Discuss the term "a seed of an idea." How does she get the idea to grow a garden in New Mexico? Name the flowers and vegetables she is thinking about on page 14. How does she invite friends and neighbors to enjoy the fruits of her garden?

- What is the purpose of the small illustrations on pages 19 and 20? Explain the color palette of these illustrations. How does the vine connect the two pages?
- What is a sanctuary? How is Georgia's garden a sanctuary for her? Explain the words on the last page of text: "To Georgia, everything was art, and art was everything."
- Return to the cover art. What does the table symbolize? How does the art represent Georgia O'Keeffe as a person and artist?
